

## Report on the use and impact of Pupil Premium funding for the 2017-2018 academic year.

### 1. Context:

- a. Pupil Premium funding is the main vehicle favoured by government to address the national academic under performance of students up to the age of sixteen who are entitled to receive free school meals or who have been in receipt of FSM financial support at any time during the past six years.
- b. The Pupil Premium takes the form of *additional* funding for each student currently entitled to receive free school meals or who have been entitled to receive free school meals at any time during the past six years.
- c. Pupil Premium funding per student is **£935**.
- d. During the 2017-2018 academic years the school received **£98,235** in Pupil Premium funding.
- e. Numbers of 11-16 Pupil Premium students in 2017-2018 were 106.
- f. The Pupil Premium funding received by the school is effectively 'ring fenced' in that it must be spent only and directly on those students currently in receipt of free school meals or who have been at any time during the past six years.
- g. For this academic year, the focus of the Pupil Premium funding was to close any attainment gap by means of focused interventions and the provision of additional support where necessary.

- A contribution in the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme
- The cost of an appropriate travel pass

- Individualised support where appropriate and necessary, including the provision of teaching assistance for students who have special educational needs.
- Targeted support to increase both the number of students making better than expected progress in GCSE English and Mathematics.
- Any requested support as agreed with the Student Premium Co-Ordinator and the Head.

Students not currently eligible to receive free school meals but who have been during the past six years will receive the following support:

- An annual uniform grant
- The cost of instrumental music tuition
- A contribution in the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme
- The cost of an appropriate travel pass
- Individualised support where appropriate and necessary, including the provision of teaching assistance for students who have special educational needs.
- Targeted support to increase both the number of students making better than expected progress in GCSE English and Mathematics.
- Any requested support as agreed with the Student Premium Co-Ordinator and the Head.
